
to connect new students to resources in the nursing program and FTCC. I am honored and excited to tell these new students what FTCC has done for me and my family.

Horace Sisk Family Scholarship

Horace Sisk was well known in Fayetteville for his pursuit of educational excellence and the preparation of students for higher educational opportunities. He retired as the superintendent of Fayetteville City Schools in 1951. Horace Sisk Junior High School was dedicated in his memory in 1962. FTCC acquired the property in 1975 and kept the name to honor Mr. Sisk as a lifelong educator who understood the important relationship between community and education.

Mary Erwin Olive and her siblings created the Horace Sisk Family Scholarship in 2000 to honor their grandfather.

"Our family continues to support this scholarship and contribute to it in honor of each other in lieu of gifts and in memory of our grandfather," said Mary Erwin Olive.

The family of Horace Sisk continues to support and believe in educational opportunities for all students. Preference is given to students enrolled in the Associates of Arts or Science program at

FTCC who show an interest in becoming a teacher. However, it is open to all students, a reflection of the expanding scope of FTCC and its opportunities for educational excellence. The generosity of the Horace Sisk family will ensure the gift of learning never ends.



Foundation Raises Funds for Nursing Expansion & Renovation

Nursing has been an important part of FTCC since the beginning of the college 60 years ago.

Renovations will soon begin to create a state-of-theart Nursing Education and Simulation Center, which will house three nursing programs - Associate Degree of Nursing, Licensed Practical Nurse, and Certified Nurse Assistant, together in one building dedicated to nursing education.

The purpose of this project is to support the growing medical needs in our region by building a sustainable healthcare talent pipeline targeting nursing professions by increasing the capacity of FTCC to support 280 nursing students.

Cumberland Community Foundation awarded FTCC Foundation \$250,000 for the nursing project in honor of their 40th anniversary. The largest grant received for the project was from the Golden LEAF Foundation for \$961,200. Other major grants have been awarded for the project from Anonymous Trust, The Cannon Foundation, Cape Fear Valley Health, and anonymous donors.

"We are grateful for the generous support of these foundations and organizations," said FTCC Foundation Executive Director Sandy Ammons. "They are committed to improving the health of our community and investing in the future of our nursing students."

EMERGENCY ASSISTANCE FOR STUDENTS

FTCC Foundation manages several funds that provide emergency assistance to students who are facing financial hardship. These funds pay for necessities such as rent, utilities, healthcare, and transportation, in addition to paying for books and tuition for students who do not have other resources.


The FTCC Food Pantry provides food, personal care items, diapers, and household cleaners for students. The Success Closet offers professional attire at no charge to the student to use for job interviews and presentations.
