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IN THE SPOTLIGHT

Casey First: Curriculum: Building Construction Technology • Employer: Southeast Connections • Job Title: Previewer

DESCRIBE A TYPICAL WORK DAY: My typical work day Monday through Wednesday begins at 3:30am when I leave for my daily commute to the office in Wilmington where I make last minute preparations for the service crews each morning. On Thursdays I go to the Fayetteville office to do the same for the crews working in the Fayetteville district. Afterwards, I leave to meet with customers and look at any residential homes or commercial buildings that are receiving natural gas services to make sure the sites are ready and give the customers a timeframe for when the services will begin and how long it will take for them to be completed. On Fridays, I sit down with the supervisors of both Fayetteville and Wilmington to coordinate the weekly schedules for the crews working in these areas.

WHAT IS YOUR FAVORITE PART OF YOUR JOB? I would have to say my favorite part of my job is being able to travel around Fayetteville and Wilmington areas and helping people. Customers are often excited to receive gas services after waiting months to either switch from electric to natural gas, (used for appliances, heating and hot water), or to finish the construction on their new homes and businesses.

WHAT IS THE MOST DIFFICULT PART OF YOUR JOB? I honestly don't find my job to be too difficult. It comes down to the ability to multitask and prioritize the job sites and making sure I schedule to best crews to get certain services done in a timely matter so both the customers are satisfied with the amount of time it took for the work to be completed, as well as stay on track with the services that take priority. For example, a home that already has a family living in it that wishes to convert to natural gas takes priority over a home that is still under construction and an existing business that is ready to open will take precedence over a business that isn't finished.

WHY DID YOU CHOOSE TO TAKE Work-Based Learning (WBL)? I chose to take Work-based learning because I see it as an opportunity to earn college credits for a job that directly relates to the degree I'm working on. Considering my job can at times demand I work 50+ hours a week, the credits I earn allow me to focus on my job that directly prepares me for my future as president of a construction company.

WHAT WOULD YOU SAY TO A NEW STUDENT ABOUT THE WBL PROGRAM? I would say that it is important to take the program seriously. Employers are always looking at performance and you would not want a poor performance to ruin the opportunity to use the time to build experience for the career you wish to pursue while simultaneously earning the credits for your degree.

WHERE DO YOU SEE YOURSELF IN FIVE YEARS? In five years I see myself being a supervisor of a Southeast Connections. My main goal is to become the president of a construction company, possibly the owner of my own construction company one day.

WHAT HAVE YOU ENJOYED MOST ABOUT YOUR CURRICULUM THUS FAR? So far I have really enjoyed the opportunities to take courses that aren't based only off textbooks and lectures in the classroom. My curriculum has allowed me to learn not just the technicalities of construction, but to go onto job sites and physically work on projects. Of course Work-based learning allowing me to include my construction job as part of my curriculum is my favorite part.

DESCRIBE A TYPICAL WORK DAY: In a typical workday I change and balance tires. I also perform preventative maintenance.

WHAT IS YOUR FAVORITE PART OF YOUR JOB? My favorite part of my job is working on the brakes. I completed my first brake job recently. I felt really good about knowing that I was able to do the job independently.

WHAT IS THE MOST DIFFICULT PART OF YOUR JOB? The electrical part of the job is the most difficult, trying to determine the issue. I take it as a challenge and the chance to learn something new.

WHY DID YOU CHOOSE TO TAKE Work-Based Learning (WBL)? I chose Work Based Learning to get hands on experience.

WHAT WOULD YOU SAY TO A NEW STUDENT ABOUT THE WBL PROGRAM? It is a good program to learn what is taught in the classroom setting.

WHERE DO YOU SEE YOURSELF IN FIVE YEARS? I currently work at Mr. Tire as a general Technician. In 5 years I plan to be a Senior Mechanic at Mr. Tire.

Active duty soldiers (Army Tuition Assistance Registration) will take place via WebAdvisor. Soldiers still need to use the GoArmyEd web portal to secure tuition assistance.
